

Luke 3-1-6 NIV

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar—when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, Herod tetrarch of Galilee, his brother Philip tetrarch of Iturea and Traconitis, and Lysanias tetrarch of Abilene—² during the highpriesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³ He went into all the country around the Jordan, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁴As it is written in the book of the words of Isaiah the prophet: "A voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him. ⁵ Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill made low. The crooked roads shall become straight, the rough ways smooth. ⁶ And all people will see God's salvation."



Grace is not just comfort- it is also a call. John's voice cried out in the wilderness, not in the city center. The desert became a sanctuary for transformation. God meets us in desolate places not to abandon us, but to prepare us.

Reflection

In what wilderness are you hearing God's call to prepare your heart?

Grace often refines us before it reveals us.

Repentance is a gift of grace- it clears the way.

- John's message was one of repentance, which is not punishment, but preparation.
- Grace makes us aware of the need to change so that we can receive more of God.

God levels valleys and mountains- He makes a path where there is none.

 The prophecy in Isaiah, quoted by John, shows how grace removes barriers.

• What seems like an impassable obstacle is no match for God's reconstructive love.

Preparation precedes glory- God moves in hearts that are ready.

- Before Christ is revealed, hearts must be softened.
- Grace tills the soil of the soul, making it fertile for His glory to grow.
